Willing attempt to count, beginning to put numbers in the correct order.</p> <p>Use comparative language such as Big and Little.</p> <p>Begin to recognise and explain simple patterns.</p> <p>Begin to talk about shapes of everyday objects.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use familiar and introduce new number rhymes. • Count in different ways and in different settings (small groups, whole class, using number cards, counting objects). • Play matching games in small groups. • Ask children to order a set of number cards. • Count parts of the body (eyes, legs etc.). • Count fingers and toes. • Staff to model mathematical language. • Begin to learn the names of colours. 	<p>Begin to identify numbers 1-10.</p> <p>Count verbally 1-10.</p> <p>Assess children's matching skills.</p>

Join construction pieces together to build.</p> <p>Begin to look at similarities and differences.</p> <p>Show an interest in the world in which we live.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Look at similarities and differences in our faces within our class (eye/hair colour). Work in pairs. • Investigating corn flour 'gloop', sand, water and dough. • Talking about where we live and our families. • Using construction toys to build homes in large and small scale. • Develop a role play doctor's surgery. 	<p>Using digital camera to take photo and look at images.</p> <p>Using interactive whiteboard to view images and make observations.</p>
