
# <u>Home School Book – Nursery</u>

# <u>Home School Book – Reception</u>

Dear Parents,

This week we enjoyed a collection of different dinosaur books, some funny and others more serious. Our focus story was Michael Foreman's 'Dinosaurs and all that rubbish'.

This week in literacy we have been looking at how to recognise, complete and form sentences by looking at the capitalised first letter, the full stop at the end and reading it to see whether or not it makes sense. We have also been practising our handwriting, making sure we still remember how to correctly form our letters and the correct orientation.

In maths we have spent the week looking at 3d shapes. We briefly covered 3d shapes before Christmas but we have started looking at them in more detail this week. The children are very good at recognising 3d shapes in their environment, linking them to a certain shape. The children are starting to name some of the 3d shapes, stating which 2d shapes are needed to make them.

In French with Mrs Scharf, we spent the week talking about carnival and all the dressing up clothes. We learnt a new song about a clown and coloured a beautiful mask.

Unfortunately it was a wet P.E. lesson so we stayed inside and played different dancing games such as musical bumps. The children also spent a short time after describing the effects that exercise can have on our bodies.

# Home School Book – Year 1

Dear Parents,

It has been great to see that most children are feeling better and have returned to class this week. Let's hope that we are over the worst of the winter bugs, I'm looking forward to the Spring! In class this week we have been continuing with our topic 'A street through time.' This week we talked about toys that children played with 100

years ago and what toys we played with now. We found out that some toys from the past are still fun to play with even now.

The swimming group enjoyed their lesson this week and they are making great progress. The current group of swimmers have 2 weeks of lessons left after half term before the groups swap over and the second group of swimmers will start. The children who have stayed at school on Tuesdays have been making good progress with their gymnastics skills, with most being able to master the pencil roll and teddy bear roll.



In literacy we have done our PiRA reading tests this week and the children have made some pleasing progress with their reading and comprehension skills. We have also revised all of the phase 3 graphemes in our phonics lessons ready for moving on to phase 4 of our letters and sounds program after the half term break. We looked at the story of Jack and the Beanstalk and the children practised sequencing the events from the story, and putting full stops at the end of sentences. This work can be seen in their home school books this week.

In French with Mrs. Scharf, we spent the week talking about carnival and how we want to dress up. We looked at masks, costumes and others accessories to dress up and listened to the story of Arlequin.

In maths we have continued to practise counting in 2s, 5s and 10s. We also practised estimating quantities and then counting large numbers of objects by grouping them into sets of 10. In art we did another piece of work based on the artist Kandinsky. This time we printed using lots of different sized circles, to match the style of one of his pieces of work. Now our Kandinsky display is complete and it certainly brightens up our classroom! And that was our week.

### Home School Book – Year 2

Dear Parents,

I am very pleased that most of the children are fit and well again. I wish a speedy recovery to those who are still unwell. Sadly, our visit to the park had to be cancelled because of the rainy weather on Tuesday. I hope to make this visit when the weather is better, later in the term.

This week, we have spent much time on revision and assessment activities. On Monday, the class completed the Progress in Reading Assessment (PIRA) tests, which showed that progress is being made by all the children.

In literacy, we shared the story of Little Beaver and the Echo, and the children then wrote their own versions of the story. The children enjoy their writing, and are, mostly, beginning to structure their work in paragraphs. They are increasingly trying to use cursive script, which we practise in handwriting sessions, and which will help their fluency in writing.

The children also played a game with Mrs Keogh, involving the vocabulary that we had studied as part of our letters about our wonderful world. After the half term, a main focus in our weekly writing sessions will be to develop the use of wider ranging and more ambitious vocabulary.

In mathematics, we looked at telling the time. This is a hard skill, but the children are beginning to master it. We will keep working on this at school, and all the children should be able to tell the time from an analogue or digital clock, by the end of Year 2. We also revised the main concepts studied in this short half term, especially counting in tens and units, counting money, calculating change, properties of 3d shapes.

In French, we started a new unit on Clothes. We talked about winter and summer clothes, we read the book "On habille Fido " on www.readinga-z.com , and we sang and acted out the song " Promenons-nous dans les Bois" ("Let's Stroll in the Woods).

In coding this week, the children again worked on their own apps, using the Discovery Coding website, to which the school subscribes. The apps are now available for you to see. You can find the website via the link on the Year 2 page of the school website. Please encourage the children to show you this page, and the links on it.

We wish you a happy half term holiday, and look forward to seeing you again after the break.

The children had tremendous fun and really enjoyed the trip. Following to all this excitement, the children also had fun celebrating the Chinese New Year.

In reading skills, the children read the comprehension "The Chinese New Year". The children had the opportunity to learn interesting facts about the Chinese New Year and how it is celebrated. It was an informative comprehension and the children learnt many new fascinating realities of this celebration. The children are now very capable at answering questions orally as well as answering in their reading skills books. We continued working on sentences in Grammar. The children worked well making sure that their sentences had a subject, verb and an object. We continued working on activities from our Grammar text books.

In maths this week we worked on factor pairs, looking at money as well as money problems. Factor pairs was challenging, especially when looking at larger numbers. The children had to think of a pair of numbers that when multiplied together would give you the answer to the total. An example of a factor number is 48 and the factor pairs for 48 are: 1 and 48, 2 and 24, 4 and 12 and so on.

As we are celebrating the Chinese New Year with the children, we decided to make a Chinese dragon in our art lesson. The children used a variety of materials to design their dragon. They used many different colours designing lovely dragons. I hope you enjoyed them. We also made wonderful Chinese lanterns and Chinese Dragon Mosaic Wands that were ready packed and the children had to follow step by step instructions in order to put it together correctly. Art was crafty and very hands on this week.

# Home School Book – Year 5

Dear Parents,

Another wet week but nothing dampens spirits more than dreaded tests!!! This week we did our annual spring reading test and finished it with a writing assessment. The composition was a piece based on a river description echoing that of Grahame's wonderful Wind in the Willows one. What an opportunity, then, for the children to show off what they could do, descriptively and imaginatively. Anyway, this week's guest-star writer is Abhiram so over to him:

On Monday, we did music with recorders first thing and then we did function machines in maths (+~). Dada (Darius) had a doctor's appointment. In the afternoon, we did guided reading [focusing on finding words or sentences in the text which prove a point] and we did circle time. This is where we had to sit in a circle and play word games [and then discussed why we appreciate our friends]. Following that, we did grammar in French.

# Home School Book - Year 6

Dear Parents,

Printing banknotes, setting fire to peanuts and making 'soldier's soup"; all in a week's work in Year 6!

I have discovered how to print money! This week, we have been busy setting up the Year 6 Bank. All the students have their own bank accounts, we have a Bank Manager, and are now creating 'Terms and Conditions' which will include debit charges for certain occurrences; not handing in homework on time, being late downstairs at the end of the day etc.. Customers may also be given credit, in the form of Year 6 banknotes, with a redeemable code, to pay into their accounts. We hope to create an online 'virtual' shop 'Sixazon' where students can spend their money. As part of this banking project, I have arranged for us to visit the National Bank of Belgium on the 15<sup>th</sup> March 2016.



This week we studied how manufacturers measure and communicate what is in our food and how people with allergies and intolerance make sure that they don't eat the wrong thing. As part of this study, we carried out an experiment to find out the calorific value of a peanut. This involved, setting fire to a peanut and placing this under a tablespoon of water. After battling against environmental conditions, we managed to 'boil' the water in the spoon. Then, using various calculations, the Year 6 scientists managed to work out the calorific value of the peanut. An additional focus of this experiment was to recognise the scientific inaccuracies of this experiment which the students correctly identified.

I am in the process of marking the pupils' Romeo and Juliet essays which is proving to be an absolute joy; I am so very proud of their efforts.
